Eastgate

It was in the Des Moines Register but recently we heard of renewed efforts underway to locate an anchor store at the 27 acre former Eastgate Shopping center. A good anchor store would attract other businesses to the area and would revitalized the area. We on the North Side want a place to spend our money locally without having to go west or south or to Ankeny and Altoona. The latest proposal is for Dahl's to build a new store at Eastgate. Many of us are excited about having a new and larger Dahl's! The current one is too small and does not have the depth and variety of merchandise of the larger stores. According to information provided to Bob Mahaffey, our City Councilman, Dahl's would sell their existing store on Euclid and build a 50,000 square foot building. That would be larger than the Dahl's on East 33rd but smaller than the Ingersoll Dahl's. Dahl's has renewed the lease at East 33rd so it is not expected to close that store. Much work and negotiations must be done by our city and county leaders for this proposal to go through but we remain hopeful.

City of Des Moines 2011 SCRUB

The Public Works Department, in cooperation with the Des Moines Neighbors and the Neighborhood Revitalization Board, has worked to schedule a number of SCRUB'S (Spring Cleanup to Remove Urban Blight). This year, the Public Works Department will continue the use of the Metro Waste Authority (MWA) Transfer Station at 4198 Delaware Avenue and Metro Waste Authority (MWA) Compost Park at 1601 Harriett Street on seven Saturdays. Also see the following guidelines and complete SCRUB calendar or call the Public Works Department 24-hour Customer Service Center at 283-4950 or for more information go to http://www.dmgov.org/Departments/PublicWorks/Pages/ScrubCalendar.aspx.

Scrub Guidelines: Residents of Des Moines ONLY: Proof of Residency required; Photo ID or current utility bill.

Hours: Neighborhood SCRUB: 7 AM to Noon

MWA's Metro Transfer Station and the Metro Compost Center: 7 AM to 1 PM Note: Metro Waste Authority's Metro Transfer Station and the Metro Compost Center are NOT open to the public, **Except on Saturday SCRUB day events.**

SCRUB Items Allowed: Trash containers, general trash including furniture, lawn mowers without fluids, TV's, computers, tires (any size, on or off rim), Appliances: NO CHARGE AGAIN THIS YEAR, air conditioners, refrigerators, freezers, microwaves, dehumidifiers, furnaces, stoves, washers, dryers, dishwashers, water heaters, etc.

SCRUB Items Not Allowed: Car batteries, propane tanks, oil, paint or other toxic or hazardous chemicals. Call Metro Waste Authority's Regional Collection Center for Household Hazardous Waste at 967-5512 to dispose of these items.

All yard waste will need to be hauled to the MWA Metro Compost Center at 1601 Harriett ST. No yard waste accepted at neighborhood SCRUB sites.

Yard waste: Brush, tree limbs 24" diameter or less, maximum length 10 feet, prunings, loose leaves, loose grass clippings.

Quik Trip Expansion

Located at the corner of East 14th and Guthrie, Quik Trip will soon be expanding. They have purchased the home directly to the north of their current parking lot. The new area will provide 9 additional parking spaces for shoppers as well as a grass and landscaped area in the back corner to reduce runoff. The project should be completed by November. Quik Trip is working with city staff now to complete the Site Plan. Neighbors attended a meeting with a QT representative in early June to understand the planned expansion and give input. As a result of that discussion, QT hopes to be able to incorporate additional exterior lighting on the south and west store walls. Everyone agreed extra lighting would provide security for the busy alley and surrounding area.

Quik Trip does not plan to add more

gas pumps; this store serves as a true neighborhood convenience grocery store; gas sales are a secondary product line.

The neighbors all agreed that Quik Trip is a great neighbor, always responsive to their concerns. Everyone looks for that relationship to continue.

Loved Ones Safe and Together

The Des Moines Police Department, in collaboration with the Alzheimer's Association, Greater Iowa Chapter, is proud to announce the creation of a new law enforcement program aimed at helping reunite individuals suffering from Alzheimer's (or any other medical condition which affects memory) who becomes separated from their families. The program is called L.O.S.T. which stands for Loved Ones Safe and Together.

So often individuals who suffer from Alzheimer's or other medical condition which involves memory loss or confusion will wander away from their home and police officers are called to assist in locating them. In addition, officers occasionally come across individuals who are lost but for whatever reason, have not been reported as such. The L.O.S.T. program consists of a computer database that is stored at the Police Department. It contains information about the person such as name, address, physical description, birth date, etc. It also contains information about the potential activities of the person, where they may be heading or where they have been found before when lost and what symptoms they may exhibit when located by the police officer. The database contains provisions for a photograph of the individual which can be sent directly to searching officers via in-car computer systems as well as the media, should they be notified to assist in finding the person. The database can be upgraded as new information or changes occur with the person.

There is no cost to participate in this program. For further information or to

enroll in the L.O.S.T. program simply contact the Des Moines Police Department Detective Bureau at 515-283-4864. An information form will be sent to you along with a stamped envelope for its return to the Police Department. In addition to the completed information form, we ask that you include a recent photograph of your loved one. If you do not have a photograph, arrangements will be made for an officer to come to your home to take a photograph for the database.

The L.O.S.T. Program is an innovative way to assist police in locating and identifying persons affected by medical conditions which could result in them becoming lost. We encourage you to participate in this pro-active program for the sake of your loved ones.

Snow Ordinance Street Program to be Expanded

The Department of Public Works is expanding its Snow Ordinance Street Program from 16 to 24 neighborhoods. Non-participating neighborhoods interested in being included in the program should submit a written letter of request by August 31, 2011. Neighborhoods turned down last year and those adjacent to the 16 included in the program will be given first consideration. If approved, streets entering the approved neighborhoods will be signed "Snow Ordinance Streets – No Parking Until Plowed", and wing plows will be used to clear these streets this winter. Union Park Pillars

You will notice some improvements in the Southeast corner of Union Park this summer. Phase one of the project was completed two years ago. It consisted of restoration of the four brick pillars near East 9th and Jefferson that had fallen into disrepair. Phase two is a little more flashy. A circle of concrete paving will be added right in front of the pillars. It will be colored and stamped to look like brick pavers. The circle will be 40' in diameter. In the center of the circle, a raised concrete planter will be built. It will be circular, with 2' tall walls and a cap on top of the wall which will be a handy bench. There is a bus stop at that corner so this will become a much nicer place to wait for the bus. The inside of the planter will be planted with various flowers and plants. All of this has been funded from two sources: a Streetscape grant from the City of Des Moines Parks and Recreation Department and from a Community Development grant from the Polk County Board of supervisors. Angela Connolly is our Polk County Supervisor and she was instrumental in mak-

Paperless Newsletters

Starting with the January 2012 Issue, we will be asking UPNA members to provide us with a working e-mail address so we may e-mail the Newsletter to them. Those who do not have an email address or still want paper newsletters will need to "opt-in for paper". The newsletter will continue to be available on our website.

The cost of printing and mailing is prohibitive and we do not have the volunteer base to assemble the newsletter. The cost to send to all 2300 households in the Union Park area is about \$650. It requires about 40 man-hours to assemble the newsletter to be ready to mail to the entire neighborhood. Thanks to grants from Polk County which pays for the printing and distribution of our newsletters, we have been able to send out four newsletters a year for the past two years. That grant could shrink or dry up, leaving us no alternative but to cut back on the number of newsletters we issue each year. We feel that with the available technology, we can do so much more than we could even 5 years ago to keep in touch with our neighbors.

For some time now, we have been sending our newsletter to members by email as well as sending a paper copy. If you are not already receiving an electronic copy of the newsletter, please drop us an e-mail at ing sure we received funding for this important project.

We hope to continue redeveloping this corner of the park. It was once a grand entrance and little by little, we are bringing it back to the beautiful spot it once was. Future plans include a walkway leading from the pillars into the park with an arbor above it. The arbor could be planted with ivy which would make a lovely walking path into the park.

SPRING GENERAL MEETING

If you missed the UPNA Spring General Meeting on May 24th, you missed a lot of good information. About 30 people attended.

Friends of Des Moines Park's, Jane Hein, provided information about the mission of the Friends and also told of \$1500 that will be dedicated to Union Park for planning of flower gardens. That was followed up by Tom McDermott who told us of the current work of planting and maintaining the existing flower gardens in the Park and future formal walking gardens near the "pillars". Mike Gaul, who supervises the activities in the Park, told of plans to open the wading pool, resurfacing and painting of the iconic Rocket Slide, and the challenges of the mowing schedule.

David Miller, who is the "Sewer Enterprise Administrator" with the City of Des Moines Public Works, discussed the current sewer separation work going on in the Union Park area, and update on the levee work and the work on Saylor Road. Marty Mauk gave a compelling discussion for a representative School Board, and if enough signatures are obtained, it will be on the fall ballot.

Then Tom and Josh Colvin from the Animal Rescue League talked about the People Safe and Pet Friendly Program.

The UPNA Officers gave committee updates and participants were given an opportunity to ask questions and exchange information. After adjournment, attendees went home with free Union Park calendars.

The Union Park Splash Pad - was closed for a few days in June out of safety concerns. The newly repainted pad needed more silicon to prevent slips and falls on the surface. Additional paint was ordered and the pad was quickly resurfaced and re-opened. While it was closed, wading pool attendants gave Union Park Splash Pad visitors free day passes to an aquatic center and a sprinkler system was set up on-site. Maps of alternative wading pool locations were distributed. Although this occurred during a hot spell, the city staff refused to compromise on citizen's safety and the free alternatives helped ease the inconvenience. A rose to the Parks Department!

A Thank You - With the help of neighbors in the 2300-2400 block of E 11th, police were able to helped calm night-time problems in the area. One rental house was designated as a Disorderly House and the landlord was sent a Specified Crime letter. It is a tribute to the residents who would not silently tolerate having their property and privacy violated by disrespectful young people and nighttime revelers. We should never hesitate to band together with our neighbors and call the police when we have concerns for our safety or property. The Parks Medical Center – We have been watching the work on the corner of East 14th and Guthrie with much anticipation and it appears the work continues to progress steadily. We don't have much information on when the new medical center will plan to have their open house, but work on the outside of the new "Prairie Style" building is in the completion phase the roof is on, the windows are in, the brickwork and stucco is done and a lot of the cement work is finished. The landscaping has a ways to go yet, but the building already looks like it will be a nice addition to the corner.
