19th Annual "Cruise to the Carousel" Car Show

Save the Date August 25, 2019 for the 19th Annual Cruise to the Carousel Car Show. Each year the Rollin' Relics car club sponsors this car show to raise funds for the Heritage Carousel to keep the cost of rides for children at just 50 cents and help maintain the Carousel. It is the longest running and largest car shows in Central Iowa.

The 2018 Cruise to the Carousel was held on Sunday, August 26, 2018 with 183 cars registered. Rollin' Relics handed out 53 awards including the Carousel Award, which went to Dean Archer of Ankeny for his 1946 Super Deluxe Ford Station Wagon. The event raised \$7000 for the Heritage Carousel and a check to the Carousel board was presented on October 1, 2018 at the Rollin' Relics monthly meeting.

Luther Memorial Church to Get a New Look

The cornerstone for the original Luther Memorial Church building was set in 1917 and the church has been an integral part of both the neighborhood and the development of Grand View University ever since. An addition was constructed in 1960 to add classroom space and accessibility to the sanctuary level. Over time, growth in the congregation and mission, plus maintenance issues on the addition, have led the congregation to pursue expansion.

The proposed project will consist of four components:

1. Removal of the existing 1960's addition on the east.

Construction of a new east addition that better-expresses the historic structure, provides more flexible gathering space, and increases accessibility with a full-size elevator.
Construction of a new addition on the west to provide a flexible contemporary fellowship hall use.

4. Front landscaping improvements that provide a more accessible entrance and better spatial relationship to the adjacent GVU buildings.

The additions total approximately 7,000 square feet and the original church building to remain is approximately 6,000 square feet. The primary material for the additions

will be natural stone masonry veneer (exact stone and product to be determined). This material is intended to relate to the historic masonry church building while also lending a more contemporary feel to the additions. Secondary materials on include vertical seam metal panel (back utility spaces), and break-metal accents. Visible through the glass facade portions will be the dynamic primary wood structure of glue-lam beams with steel tension rods.

SCRUB Event - Free Drop Off

SCRUB stands for <u>SPRING CLEAN-</u> UP to <u>REDUCE URBAN BLIGHT</u>. It is the city's mission to enhance the City's neighborhoods by allowing residents an opportunity to remove yard waste and debris from homes and yards to reduce the blighted areas with the City.

What kind of SCRUB events does the City of Des Moines sponsor?

MEGA SCRUB: An event that is hosted by select neighborhoods within their section of the City. Any Des Moines Resident may participate.

Transfer Station SCRUB: An alternate drop-off location used for SCRUB events. The Metro Waste Transfer Station is located at 4198 Delaware Ave.

Compost Site SCRUB: A drop off site designated for yard and tree debris during SCRUB events. The Metro Waste Compost Site is located at 1601 Harriett Street.

SCRUB Event Reminders Free Drop off -Delays Possible Proof of Residency is required - Bring a photo id or current utility bill.

MEGA SCRUB's now offer Household Hazardous Waste Disposal. See list of items on the City of Des Moines Website (MEGA SCRUB sites only).

SCRUB'S are free to Des Moines citizens, therefore you may experience longer wait times based on participation.

Union Park will officially be 125 years old this year. The park was dedicated on July 8, 1896 with much fanfare. UPNA has appointed a committee to plan a 125th Anniversary celebration.

Settlement in the Union Park area began in 1849, when Andrew McFadden Thompson received a land grant from the U.S. Government for 200 acres. Before he died in 1856, he had acquired 1,325 acres in northeast Des Moines along the Des Moines River. (The Thompson name is preserved in one of the most famous tree-lined streets in the city, Thompson Avenue, and a curve in the river known as Thompson Bend, near Union Park).

The original 16 acres of Union Park was acquired by the city park commissioners from the Thompson family and was situated partly in Lee and partly in Des Moines Townships and hence was aptly named "Union Park". Over the years, more land was acquired to encompass 51 acres of park land.

The day the park was dedicated in 1896 was a beautiful day. A municipal July Fourth celebration had been delayed until July 8 because the park was to be dedicated at the same time the town celebrated its 50th anniversary with a golden jubilee. Half a century before, the town of Fort Des Moines had been surveyed and on July 8 the town plat was filed.

A crowd estimated at 20,000 people, about 25 percent of the town's population, was at the park that day. They came by street cars, carriages and walked to the park.

A land parade began at 9:30 a.m. at the river on West Grand Avenue, winding its way to 12th Street, then back to the river and across to East Ninth Street, then north to Union Park. An hour later a water parade began at the Center Street dam, headed by a fleet of 10 canoes led by "Commodore" Tacitus Hus-

sey and his wife. Next came rowboats, four abreast in squadrons 30 feet apart. The crowd excitedly pointed out the large new steamer, the W.H. Lehman.

A huge picnic was held under the oak trees. In the evening, the crowd was treated to the sight of a bicycle parade of gigantic proportions, featuring 2,000 decorated bicycles.

The dedication of Union Park was completed that night with a magnificent fireworks display.

In 1928, many years after the park was dedicated, the park board bought the old home of that early settler, Andrew Thompson. The intended use for the old house was as a pioneer museum, featuring early furniture, tools and artifacts. A visitor fell on a piece of broken cement and, in an action more in tune with modern times, promptly sued the city. Rather than repair it, the city tore the building down. As it was being tore down, the year "1843" was discovered burned into a black walnut beam. Grant Wood painted this house and its site, and a copy of this oil picture can be seen today at Dunn's Funeral Home on Grand Avenue in Des Moines.

At one time, the Thompson family cemetery was situated in the southwest corner of the park, near the corner of East Jefferson and Penn Avenue. The exact location is uncertain but it has been determined that by 1899, the five remains and headstones were moved to Pine Hill Cemetery, north of Des Moines. The headstones are unreadable and the Pine Hill records were destroyed in a fire, but it is certain the final resting places for the five are at Pine Hill.

Union Park had many features, including some not seen in today's park. There was an aviary, greenhouses, gardens, a bathhouse and a bandstand in the center of a manmade lagoon. A beautiful white-painted octagonal pavilion was completed in 1898. The pavilion, once the center of east Des Moines social life, was tom down in 1930.

Many Scandinavian immigrants settled the Union Park neighborhood. They included Norwegian and Swedish immigrants. In 1898 efforts by the East Side Commercial Club, lead by David H. Kooker, persuaded the Danish Evangelical Church in America to relocate their seminary to the neighborhood from Racine, Wisconsin. The institution was renamed "Grand View College" and remains a pillar of the neighborhood to the present day as a University. The integrity of these early settlers and the presence of the college established the neighborhood's deep and abiding respect for education and honesty in government.

During its early days, the Union Park area was known as "Snusville," because of the snuff (or "snus") that many residents favored. During World War II, this moniker was reconstituted as the name of a local newsletter, "The Snooseville Snooper." It contained local news and was distributed to neighborhood men and women serving in the armed forces to keep them in touch with their home and neighbors.

In 1987, neighborhood leaders organized the Union Park Neighborhood Association. This association through its Steering Committee provides leadership and work with city staff to address resident concerns and improve the quality of life within the neighborhood.

About 50 people were in attendance.

Neighborhood Volunteer: Tom and Yvonne McDermott - for coordinating the UPNA Lawn Of The Week Award program since 2012. They are the best ambassadors for the Union Park Neighborhood. During summer months, they scout the neighborhood for lawns deserving of our green and white signs that proclaim "Union Park Neighborhood Lawn of the Week".

Public Servant: Officer Scott Baker – Assigned to Union Park in 2011, Scott proudly serves as our Neighborhood Based Service Delivery police officer. He truly has the interest of our neighborhood in his heart. He educates us and responds to our issues and concerns. Our crime rate is lower than the neighborhoods around us because of Scott.

Local Business: Home Opportunities Made Easy, Inc. (HOME, Inc.), Pamela S. Carmichael Executive Director – UPNA honors HOME Inc because of the multitude of investments and services they have provided not only in our neighborhood but in the Greater Des Moines Area. Investments in the neighborhood include acquiring and rehabbing homes, building new homes in the Birdland area, and infilling houses on empty lots - an investment of approximately \$2.5 million just in the Union Park area. They have counseling and education programs that assist landlords and tenants, homebuyers and those facing homelessness. HOME, Inc. is the oldest private, non-profit housing organization in Des Moines.
